Program

- Certificate of completion, a prerequisite to register for the National Medical Interpreter exam

Details

- Courses are entirely online
- Open to spoken and sign language interpreters
- Courses and final exams are administered in English
- Fees includes textbooks, workbooks, and handouts

Requirements

- Bilingual and at least 18 years old
- High school education or equivalent
- Complete the registration form
- Submit a résumé, showing educational attainment, past interpreting and work experience, or language proficiency tests taken for the non-native language only

Fees

- **\$275** per person for 48 hours
- **\$200** per person if more than one person from the same agency
- **\$200** per person for 40 hours (no Medical Terminology for Interpreters)
- **\$75** per person for 8 hours of Medical Terminology Training (requires prior Community Interpreting Training)
